SCARBOROUGH SCHOOL SYSTEM

Scarborough has 3 elementary, 1 intermediate, 1 middle, and 1 high schools.

Serves almost 3,000 students from K through 12th grade.

78.3% are owner-occupied.

96.3% have a computer and 91.2% have Internet access. 3.9% of residents live below the poverty level.

98.1% of residents 25+ are high school graduates or higher. 54.6% of residents 25+ have bachelor's degree or higher.

92.63% of the population is white.

0.25% is black.

0.58% is American Indian/Alaskan Native.

2.85% is Asian.

3.69% is multiracial.

Total population of about 24 000

LIBRARY PROFILE

The Scarborough Public Library operates as a private, nonprofit, tax-exempt corporation and is governed by a Board of Trustees made up of 11 residents (including one appointed member of the Town Council and a representative of the Friends of the Library). Funds to operate the library come primarily, but not exclusively, from the town. Additional revenues include donations and Friends' support. Following an informal procedure established in 1934, municipal officials and library trustees cooperate in providing library services without charge to residents of the community.

Quick Facts

Library visitors increased from 28,000 in 1989, to 108,000 in 2023.

Afterschool visitors average about 60 per school day.

Circulation averages over 210,000 items per year, with 170,000 physical items and 37,000 digital items lent in 2022 as the pandemic began to ease.

22 employees and over 20 volunteers.

Collection comprised of more than 80,000 print and A/V materials and 32,000 digital titles.

Annual budget of \$1.2 million.

2023 – New library director, Chip Schrader, begins his tenure.

- Access to online learning services and subscription databases

GOAL 2:

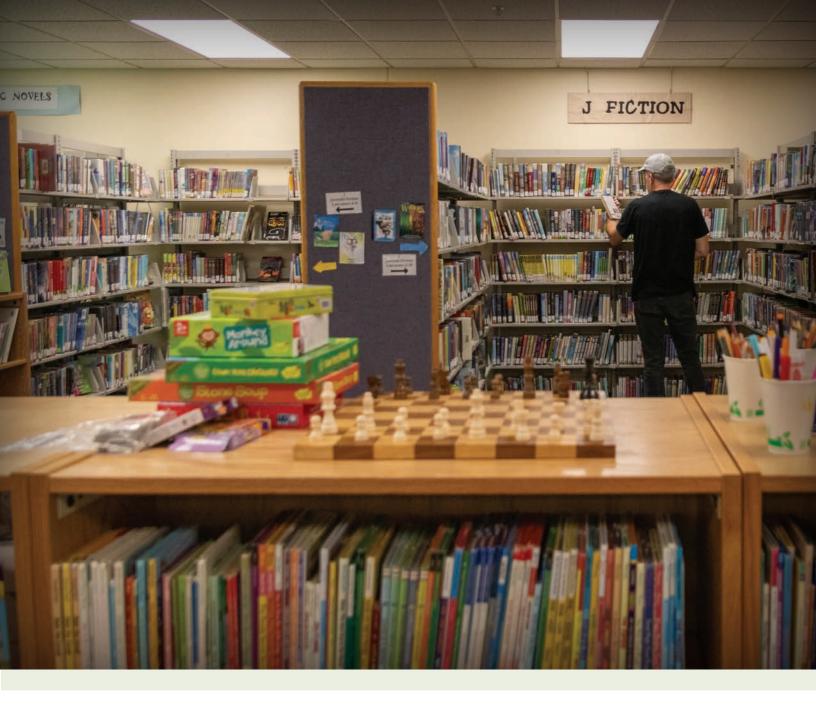
Serve the Intellectual and Creative Needs of the Scarborough Community.
